Also present were Westfield State University President Dr. Linda Thompson; Institutional Advancement Vice President Lisa McMahon; Director of Advancement and Major Gifts, William Hynes; Assistant Director of Events Management, Ryan Begin; Event Management and Student Activities, Laura Cafaro; Director of Alumni Relations, Ryan Meersman and General Counsel, Melinda Phelps. Special guest, Kathy Howrigan of Howrigan Consulting.

The meeting was called to order at 11:20 AM by Committee Chair Dr. Gloria Williams and it was announced that the meeting was being livestreamed and recorded.

MOTION made by Trustee Currier, seconded by Trustee Montemayor, to accept the minutes from the October 23, 2024 meeting. There being no discussion, a roll call was conducted, all in favor, the **Motion passed.**

University Rebrand and Marketing Initiatives Update

Dr. Leslie Rice opened her presentation by explaining the partnership with BVK, a national firm, focusing on rebranding. The research portion has been completed, moving on to analysis and findings. To enhance success and academics, Westfield State University needs to cultivate a growing community and culture to produce perception. The next steps for the revealing of the brand platform will be presented in spring of 2025. The last rebranding Westfield State University did was in 2016.

Advancement/Fundraising/Engagement/Alumni/Campaign

Lisa McMahon opened her presentation with pictures and information on the Blue Diamond Ball. The monies brought in from the Blue Diamond Ball was 320k which created two new scholarships and renaming the soccer field. A 100k will be sent to student ACCESS.

An update on alumni events going forward:

The 1970 soccer team visited campus in the renaming of the soccer field. Homecoming also brought many albums to campus including the Cape Cod Westfield State University Chapter who handed out clam chowder. The advancement team will be visiting Naples, Florida again this year as well as Georgia because Dr. Thompson will be receiving an award. Upcoming events were announced.

Situational Assessment conducted by Howrigan Consulting:

Kathy Howrigan presented her one-year study in 2019. COVID ended that study, but the outcome compared to 2024 showed changes in structure in advancement and leadership. The advancement team is insufficiently sourced therefore with five extra staff members, a campaign could be conducted.

Current key findings:

- 1. There was progress made in on vision and aspiration
- 2. Advancement is not funded enough
- 3. The team has a shared understanding
- 4. Data quality issues staffing issue
- 5. Multi-year plan needs to be created but there are a lack of resources

Actions to be taken:

- 1. Work with an external firm to identify 50-100 prospects
- 2. Operational challenges:
 - a. Develop a multi-year plan
 - b. Fix data quality issues
 - c. Focus more on retention of donors
- 3. Set a goal

The campaign needs to be robust with more staff, major gift giving cultivation, repair operational challenges and create an achievable goal. FY26 plan will have a holistic approach with institutional goals.

FDFI is a non-profit, abolitionist and antiracist organization that celebrates the legacies of her famous ancestors and focuses on education, racial equity, and an end to human exploitation. She is the proud mother of Kenneth B. Morris, Jr., Nettie Douglass Johnson and Douglass Washington Morris, and proud grandmother of four plus a bonus grandson.


Mekhi Bowen '25 Criminal Justice

Dr. Carlton Pickron is a dedicated higher education leader with a distinguished career of over 35 years with Westfield State University. 




