### Minutes

February 19, 2026 4:00 p.m.

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**MEMBERS PRESENT:** Chair Ali Salehi, Vice Chair Melissa Alvarado, and Trustees, Barney Garcia, George Gilmer, Theresa Jasmin, Tessa Lucey, Chris Montemayor, Jason Queenin, Michael O'Rourke, William Reichelt and Gloria Williams.

Also present and participating was Westfield State University President Dr. Linda Thompson.

Board Chair Salehi called the meeting to order at 4:02 p.m. He announced that the meeting was being livestreamed and recorded.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Gilmer and seconded by Trustee Lucey, to approve the meeting minutes of December 18, 2025. There being no discussion, a roll call was conducted, **motion passed unanimously.**

**MOTION** made by Trustee Jasmin and seconded by Trustee Gilmer, to approve the meeting minutes of February 2, 2026. There being no discussion, a roll call was conducted, **motion passed unanimously.**

### General Announcements

#### **Innovation and Restructuring**

- The University must restructure human and financial resources to support student success.
- Reorient enrollment strategies to reach adults and certificate-seeking learners.
- Strategic and facilities master plans should guide action, investment, and transformation.

#### **Strategic Plan Monitoring**

- Every standing committee will review and monitor progress on the strategic plan.
- Performance indicators will be reviewed regularly.
- The goal is to provide accessible, affordable, and exceptional education.

#### **Faculty Union Meeting**

- A listening meeting was requested by faculty union members.
- Dr. Thompson, Vice Chair Alvarado, and Chair Salehi met with two faculty members.
- Conflicting reports and perceptions were received from other faculty members.
- Trustee Alvarado and Chair Salehi reported Dr. Thompson is effectively involved with executive functions. Dr. Thompson and her entire cabinet have the Board's full support and unwavering confidence.

#### **Chair's Term and Acknowledgements**

- Chair Salehi's term is ending after three years. The Board will nominate Slate Officers which

will be voted on at the June 11, 2026 meeting.

## **President's Report**

### **Challenges Facing Higher Education**

- Declining demographics, shifting federal and state requirements, financial pressure, and changing workforce demands. Cannot rely on past solutions or successes.
- Demographic cliff: sharp decline in traditional college-age students leading to increased competition. The value of an undergraduate degree is being redefined due to free community college, three-year bachelor's programs, and scrutiny on return on investment.
- Federal priorities are shifting, causing funding gaps. The state government has been innovative in helping fill those gaps, but it's not enough.

### **Strategic Plan: Infinite Opportunities**

- Built on four pillars:
  - Innovative learning: Aligning programs with future careers.
  - Student success: Ensuring community and resources for graduation and meaningful work.
  - Strategic stewardship: Aligning people, finances, and facilities.
  - Institutional impact: Cultivating scholars who drive research and transformative partnerships.
- The goal is to align these pillars to meet challenges head-on. Requires bold action and challenging the status quo.

### **Human Health and Life Science Innovation Center**

- Proposal to create a human health hub on campus. Represents a proposed investment of more than \$140 million. The BRIGHT Act includes a \$100 million appropriation for Westfield State.
- Aims to address healthcare workforce shortages and health inequities in Western Massachusetts with collaboration between Westfield State University, Holyoke Community College, and Baystate Health.
- Aligns with the Commonwealth's priorities in public health, workforce development, higher education modernization, and regional economic resilience.

### **As Schools Match Wits 65th Anniversary Documentary**

- The Media Services team, especially Alex Simisky, produced a documentary celebrating the 65th year anniversary of As Schools Match Wits. The film honors the program's history and impact on students, educators, and families in Western Massachusetts.
- The documentary was produced in partnership with New England Public Media and features archival footage, interviews, and behind-the-scenes stories from 1961 to today.
- Westfield State has carried on the legacy of the program since WWLP canceled it in 2006.

### **Recognition**

- Dining services team received the Employer of the Year Award from Viability. The award recognizes inclusive, sustainable hiring practices. Director Melissa Sikes and staff will receive the award in Boston in April.
- Dr. Princey from the psychology department is using a new insect incubator for student research. Students are using genetically altered fruit flies to study sleep, wake cycles, alcohol sensitivity, and anxiety.
- Dr. Zara Khan Caldwell published her book, *The Fiercest Kind- Five Black Women in Art, Performance and Renaissance from 1937 to 1965*. The book explores how African American artists fought racism and sexism. There may be a book signing in the fall.

- The facilities and operations team is thanked for their work during the winter storm on January 25th and 26th. They worked to keep roads, walkways, resident halls, and essential operations safe.

### **Student Trustee Report**

Trustee Barney Garcia provided updates on the Student Government Association's activities since the December meeting.

### **SGA Floor Renovation**

- The SGA floor was renovated over winter break to digitize weekly governance operations. Two large televisions were installed to replace the old projector and screen setup. Meetings can now be paper free as agendas and meeting materials are now posted on the screens. Digital clickers will soon be implemented for members to cast their votes.

### **Finance Policies Review**

- Increased patterns and understanding around clubs have prompted a review of finance policies.
- Exploring the possibility of proactively allocating funds to clubs with an initial budget upon the beginning of each fiscal year.

### **Senior Festivities**

- Hundreds of seniors gathered at the Westfield River Brewing Company to celebrate 100 days until commencement. The event marks the kickoff of a series of events leading down to the end of the spring semester put on by the Senior class council of 2026.

### **BRIGHT Act Advocacy**

- The State Universities of Massachusetts Council Presidents will be hosting an Advocacy Day at the State House on February 26th. Students will be traveling to Boston to speak with elected officials on the BRIGHT Act. The goal is to see the inclusion of \$125 million in the FY27 budget to address deferred maintenance needs and increase state contributions towards student financial aid.

### **Western Massachusetts SGA Summit**

- Prospectively engaging regional partners in hosting a Western Massachusetts SGA Summit, bringing together community college and state university peers.
- The intention is to plant the seed towards interest in future engagement with other universities.

### **Civic Engagement and Freedom of Speech**

- The SGA held a listening session between leadership, the Dean of Students, and campus affinity groups. The SGA President has worked with the President's Office to collaborate on communications pertaining to freedom of speech and concerns surrounding Turning Point USA's presence on campus.

### **Unity Fest**

- Preparations are underway for the second annual Unity Fest. This is a week-long event that pulls in organizations such as the Black Student Union, Muslim Student Organization, Latina association for Empowerment, Queer Straight alliance, etc.

### **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Concerns**

- Chair Ali Salehi has expressed a commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. He has acknowledged student concerns about belonging and safety on campus due to federal actions related to ICE and the reduction of opportunity and equity programs. Recent court actions, such as the Young Americans for Freedom vs. Department of Education case, are dismissing equity and inclusion programs as unconstitutional. There are concerns about the removal of references to diversity, equity, and inclusion from the University website.
- Assurance that the Board's commitment to underserved and underprivileged students remains unchanged, regardless of external pressures.

## Student Success and Learning Committee

Committee Chair Chris Montemayor updated the Board:

- Dr. Salka shared an update on the success grant, which supports “at-risk” students. The student support program is broken down into two broad categories: supporting a unique targeted population and supporting all students in general through the Banacos Center.
  - Programs include the LEAD Scholar program (formerly Urban Ed program) and the TRIO program, which provide structured support, advising, and academic preparation. Other programs include academic advising and transfer transition support, and the Course Achievement Center, which provides success coaches offering wraparound support services.
- KPIs were reviewed, including first-year retention trends, which have shown steady improvement from 86% to 89.5% over the last four years.
  - Academic warning data highlighted persistent challenges among lower GPA students, with academic warnings increasing from 14% in fall 2024 to 16.5% in fall 2025.
  - Rising academic warning rates and high DWF rates from lower GPA students underscore the need for sustained and targeted intervention.
- The University's athletic program is thriving both in athletics and in the classroom.
  - The average GPA is 3.11 among over 490 students, with 302 having a GPA average of 3.0.
  - 189 students were named to the MASCAC honor roll, and 23 were named to the Middle East honor roll.
- Fall sports achievements include MASCAC championships in women's cross country, field hockey, and women's soccer. The field hockey and women's soccer teams appeared in the NCAA tournament. The University is currently in second place for the Smith Cup.
- Support systems for athletes include athletic training and health services, a fueling station for nutrition and strength and conditioning, and mental health support and services.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Williams and seconded by Trustee Gilmer, the granting of the honorary Doctor Humane Letters to General Clara Adams-Ender (Ret), effective February 19, 2026. There being no discussion, **ROLL CALL VOTE**, motion passed.

**MOTION** made by Trustee O'Rourke and seconded by Trustee Montemayor, the granting of the Honorary Doctor of Public Service to Mr. Kevin Queenin effective February 19, 2026. There being no discussion, **ROLL CALL VOTE**, motion passed.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Jasmin and seconded by Trustee Lucey, the granting of the honorary Doctor Humane Letters to Lawrence Gwozdz effective February 19, 2026. There being no discussion, **ROLL CALL VOTE**, motion passed.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Jasmin and seconded by Trustee Gilmer, the granting of the honorary Doctor of Laws to Maurice A. Watson effective February 19, 2026. There being no discussion, **ROLL CALL VOTE**, motion passed.

## University Success Committee

Committee Chair William Reichelt updated the Board:

- It was reported on a conversation with the provost about retention, noting that the numbers are getting better.
- Residence Life reported that students are generally happy living on campus and are receiving various services.

- Inclusion and Belonging will be added as a discussion point with this committee.

### Finance Committee

Committee Chair George Gilmer updated the Board on the following:

- The committee discussed the university cash summary, budget to actual, FY27 budget planning, and the fourth quarter investment report.

#### **University Cash Summary**

- The University has \$89 million in cash for 2026, compared to \$79 million in 2025.
- There is \$19 million of working capital for day-to-day operations.

#### **Budget to Actual**

- Through the end of January, the university is \$11.4 million better than last year.
- Favorable revenue variances are driven by higher state appropriation and grant revenue.

#### **Fiscal Year 27 Budget Planning**

- The goal is to have a balanced budget.
- Strategic investments are about \$4 to 5 million outside of the budget.

#### **Fourth Quarter Investment Report**

- The portfolio grew by \$5.3 million, ending December at \$43.7 million.
- There was discussion about investments in the Magnificent Seven and potential rate reductions next year.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Jasmin and seconded by Trustee Gilmer, to approve the consolidation of Westfield State University's two investment accounts into one, as recommended by investment advisors, Fund Evaluation Group (FEG). The consolidation will simplify reporting and account management. The aggregated account will reflect the integration of the current asset allocation of equities and fixed income. There being no discussion, a roll call was taken, **motion passed unanimously.**

**MOTION** made by Trustee Montemayor and seconded by Trustee Garcia, to approve the FY27 tuition and fee schedule, as presented. There being no discussion, a roll call was taken, **motion passed unanimously.**

### Audit Committee

Committee Chair Theresa Jasmin updated the Board on the following:

- Presentations by external, internal auditors, and the IT department.
- External auditors presented results of two recent audits:
  - Massachusetts Office of Student Financial Aid: Received a clean opinion. This audit is completed every three years as long as there is a clean opinion.
  - Uniform Guidance Report: Clean opinion, but one repeat finding related to the timeliness of reporting enrollment changes for students.
- Internal auditors (Boston Consortium) talked about planning for internal audits.
  - Recommended internal audit related to Clery Act compliance.
  - Recommended audit of institutional advancement, (to start in May or June).
- Alan Blair presented the results of the audit for compliance with payment card industry (PCI) security standards. The University passed this audit.

**MOTION** made by Trustee Gilmer seconded by Trustee Jasmin, to accept the agreed upon procedures report pursuant to the Massachusetts Office of Student Financial Assistance attestation guide for fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, as

prepared by the firm of WithumSmith and Brown P.C., and to authorize the submission of this report to the State Comptroller's Office and the Department of Higher Education. A **roll call** was completed. **Motion passed.**

**MOTION** made by Trustee Lucey seconded by Trustee Jasmin to accept the audit report on the audit procedures required pursuant to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Uniform Guidance for fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, as prepared by the firm of WithumSmith and Brown P.C., and to authorize the submission of this report to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse and to other parties as required by OMB Uniform Guidance and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. A **roll call** was completed. **Motion passed.**

**MOTION** made by Trustee Gilmer seconded by Trustee Williams to approve the internal audit plan as recommended by the Boston Consortium group in the February 2026 memorandum. A **roll call** was completed. **Motion passed.**

There being no further business,

**MOTION** made by Trustee Williams, and seconded by Trustee Lucey, to adjourn. A roll call was conducted, **motion passed unanimously.**

### **Faculty Seeking Promotion to Full Professor at Westfield State University**

**Name** Paul Cacolice **Department:** Sports Medicine & Human Performance

Professor Cacolice joined Westfield State in 2016 at the rank of Assistant Professor. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 2021 and tenured in 2022. His department chair describes him as “a rigorous and well-organized teacher, a committed advisor and mentor, an actively engaged scholar, and a steady, dependable contributor in service. Professor Weglarz joined Westfield State in 2020 at the rank of Assistant Professor, and was promoted to Associate in 2025. She teaches a broad range of foundational, methods-based, diversity-focused, and field-based courses. She has published several articles and currently has a manuscript under review. **FY27 Preliminary Capital Budget**

**Overview**

The University is submitting a preliminary capital budget request to solicit and bid a variety of projects now, to allow an early summer start. State procurement laws and regulations requires that projects are publicly bid and awarded. This process may take 3-6 months before a contract is fully executed. In order to begin our summer projects in June, the University is seeking approval on the projects listed below so bids/contracts can begin as soon as possible.

**This is only a preliminary capital project listing. The full list of requests will be provided at the June 2026 Board of Trustees meeting once capital projects have been reviewed and prioritized.**

**Preliminary Capital Projects**

1. Water Main Replacement – Water system piping must be replaced as it is original to the campus. The total estimated cost is \$1.4M. A phase approach will be used to spread the cost over multiple years. The campus will use a combination of campus funds and DCAMM funds of approximately \$675,000 this year.
2. Horace Mann Boilers – Boilers in Horace Mann have been failing and emergency repairs have been made to keep systems operational. The planned replacement last year was put on hold but can no longer be delayed. Estimated cost for the boiler is \$400,000.
3. Woodward Field House Lighting Phase 2 – This project is a continuation of lighting replacement that began last year with an initial investment of \$180,000. There are ongoing issues with flashing and failing of obsolete fixtures which impact events and team sports in the facility. Second phase is an additional \$150,000 to replace the remainder of lights in the field house.
4. DCAMM Match – The funding for this amount, \$412,702, is our required DCAMM match of 32% on every project partially funded by DCAMM. Without the campus match, projects cannot proceed. The primary projects funded with the match this year is targeted for the water main project and sidewalks/roadways.
5. Roads/Sidewalk Projects – While most of the funding for these projects are sourced from DCAMM, there is funding allocated to this project in the DCAMM Match as noted above. Certain parking lots, roadways and sidewalks are in disrepair, and an annual allocation is critical to continue to improve asphalt surfaces that need attention.

## TRUST FUND MANAGEMENT

### PURPOSE

The term “trust funds” as used in public higher education refers to non- state appropriated funds held by the university. The statutory authority for trust funds is found in Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 15A, Section 9 (N) and 22 (E), Chapter 73 Section 14 and Chapter 75 Section 11. This policy sets forth trust fund guidelines, fees associated with trust funds, types of funds held in university trust, the manner for approving fees and funds, and financial institutions where trust funds are held.

### POLICY

#### General Guidelines:

- A. The Board of Trustees has the responsibility for all university trust funds.
- B. The Board of Trustees, or designee as detailed below, approves relevant fees that support trust funds.
- C. The Board of Trustees, or designee as detailed below, approves the establishment of a trust fund or modification of an existing trust fund.
- D. The Board of Trustees approves all bank accounts holding university trust funds.
- E. The Board of Higher Education’s *Standards for the Expenditure of Trust Funds* provides minimum standards for the administration of university trust funds, but the Board of Trustees may develop more restrictive institutional guidelines and standards.
- F. Trust funds are not permitted to deficit spend and funds may only be moved out of trust funds as detailed below.
- G. All expenditures of trust funds will adhere to all state regulations and all university policies and procedures.
- H. The Board of Trustees authorizes trust fund expenditures as follows:
  - 1.) ~~4.)~~ The President may spend up to \$500,000 for any single item and/or contract that is part of the annual budget. Any item and/or ~~contract~~~~project~~ in excess of \$500,000 must have the approval of the Board of Trustees.
    - a.) The President may temporarily delegate any amount up to \$500,000 to a member of Cabinet the Chief of Staff or another Vice President with Department Head Signature Authority (DHSA) for

## Types of Fees and Approval Authority:

**Mandatory Student Fees** - ~~R~~Required fees charged to students enrolled in credit coursework. This type of fee applies to a large proportion of students, with few exceptions. Examples include: general fee, technology fee, capital improvement fee, student activity fees, and DGCE's tuition, educational service fee, and registration fee. The Board of Trustees approves all mandatory student fees ~~at the annual June meeting.~~

**Auxiliary Operations Charges** – ~~C~~charges for auxiliary operations funded by student fees or auxiliary revenues. Auxiliary operations are managed as self-supporting activities though the fees they charge their customers for goods or services rendered. Examples include: room, board, fitness center. The Board of Trustees approves the establishment of major auxiliary operations charges/~~fees at the annual June meeting.~~

**Non-Mandatory Fees** – ~~O~~ptional or one-time fees charged to students for a specific purpose or special program/course offering. This fee is not required of the majority of students each year. Examples of non-mandatory fees include: non-credit courses, summer programs, testing fees, equipment fees, laboratory fees, transcript fee, late registration fee, late payment fees, parking fee. The President approves non-mandatory fees. A schedule of all non-mandatory fees will be

provided to the Board of Trustees ~~at the annual June meeting.~~

## Types of Trust Funds and Approval Authority

**General Trust Fund** – Accounts within ~~this g~~General Trust ~~F~~fund are allocated across University departments and are used to account for the general operations of the

~~U~~iversity. The Board of Trustees approves the ~~G~~general Trust ~~F~~fund and its annual budget. Funds may be transferred between accounts within the ~~G~~general Trust ~~F~~fund following ~~U~~university policy. Funds may be transferred from the ~~G~~general Trust ~~F~~fund to the ~~C~~capital Project ~~F~~fund or ~~O~~other Trust ~~F~~unds with approval of the Vice President of Administration and Finance. The President will be notified of all fund transfers on a quarterly basis.

**Capital Project Trust Fund** – Accounts within ~~the this e~~Capital Project Trust ~~f~~Fund are used to account for expenses related to facilities renewal and replacement, deferred maintenance, and capital asset acquisition.

Once the Board of Trustees has voted and approved the total annual budget, including capital projects, ~~the~~ is vote of the Board of Trustees will act as the formal project approval to move forward on ~~all~~ projects within the approved total budget. The only signature authority required for individual project documents (e.g., contracts, award documents, requisitions, invoices) will be the ~~Assistant Associate Vice President Executive Director~~ of Facilities and Capital Planning and the Vice President of Administration and Finance, regardless of the total amount per project.

Due to the uncertainty of estimating construction costs, individual capital budget project costs may vary from the initial estimate. The ~~Assistant Associate Vice President Executive Director~~

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~~of Facilities and Capital Planning~~, in consultation with the Vice President of Administration and Finance, may reallocate funds from one capital project to another but will not exceed the total approved capital budget. However, if the project cost comes in 25% over the original amount approved by vote of the Board of Trustees, the project will go back to the Board of Trustees for review~~explanation~~ and vote approval.

For new or emergency projects that do not fall within the annual approved budget, the President is the designated authority to establish accounts within the Capital Projects Trust Fund under \$500,000. Any project over \$500,000, which is not part of the annual budget or an emergency, requires Board of Trustees vote approval. Funds may be transferred between accounts within the Capital Project Fund following University policy.

**Other Trust Funds** – Other trust funds receive direct revenue to cover expenses

within ~~the~~Other Trust Funds. Each is considered its own trust fund. ~~These~~  
Other Trust Funds are used to

track activities not otherwise classified. The Board of Trustees establishes eOther Trust Funds. Revenue may not be transferred between or out of Other trust Funds, unless approved by the President and the Vice President of Administration and Finance.

**Auxiliary Operation Trust Funds** - An Auxiliary Operation Trust Fund is an entity that exists to furnish goods or services primarily to benefit students, faculty or staff, and that charges a fee directly related to, although not necessarily equal to, the cost of the goods or services. ## TRUST FUND MANAGEMENT

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- D. The Board of Trustees approves all bank accounts holding University trust funds.
- E. The Board of Higher Education’s *Standards for the Expenditure of Trust Funds* provides minimum standards for the administration of University trust funds, but the Board of Trustees may develop more restrictive institutional guidelines and standards.
- F. Trust funds are not permitted to deficit spend and funds may only be moved out of trust funds as detailed below.
- G. All expenditures of trust funds will adhere to all state regulations and all University policies and procedures.
- H. The Board of Trustees authorizes trust fund expenditures as follows:
  1. The President may spend up to \$500,000 for any single item and/or contract that is part of the annual budget. Any item and/or contract in excess of \$500,000 must have the approval of the Board of Trustees.
  2. The Vice President of Administration and Finance may spend up to \$250,000 for any single item and/or contract that is part of the annual budget.
    - i. The following are exceptions to the limitations for the President and Vice President of Administration and Finance: Dining Services expenditures, utilities, and the biweekly *Payroll Expenditure Approval Form*.
  3. Cabinet Members who’ve been delegated Department Head Signature Authorization (DHSA) may spend up to \$50,000 for any single item and/or contract that is part of the annual budget.

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- i. The President may temporarily delegate an amount up to \$500,000 to a member of Cabinet with Department Head Signature Authority (DHSA) for the purpose of continued operations while the President is out-of-office.
    4. Other employees that have been delegated Department Head Signature Authorization (DHSA) may spend up to \$25,000 for any single item and/or contract that is part of the annual budget.
      - I. All trust fund activities are subject to regular audit and inspection by the Office of the State Auditor and the Board of Higher Education.
      - J. The President or the Board of Trustees may also request separate audits of trust funds or of a particular trust fund.

## Types of Fees and Approval Authority:

**Mandatory Student Fees** - Required fees charged to students enrolled in credit coursework. This type of fee applies to a large proportion of students, with few exceptions. Examples include: general fee, technology fee, capital improvement fee, student activity fees, and DGCE's tuition, educational service fee, and registration fee. The Board of Trustees approves mandatory student fees.

**Auxiliary Operations Charges** – Charges for auxiliary operations funded by student fees or auxiliary revenues. Auxiliary operations are managed as self-supporting activities through the fees they charge their customers for goods or services rendered. Examples include: room, board, fitness center. The Board of Trustees approves the establishment of major auxiliary operations charges/fees.

**Non-Mandatory Fees** – Optional or one-time fees charged to students for a specific purpose or special program/course offering. This fee is not required of the majority of students each year. Examples of non-mandatory fees include: non-credit courses, summer programs, testing fees, equipment fees, laboratory fees, transcript fee, late registration fee, late payment fees, parking fee. The President approves non-mandatory fees. A schedule of all non-mandatory fees will be provided to the Board of Trustees.

## Types of Trust Funds and Approval Authority

**General Trust Fund** – Accounts within General Trust Fund are allocated across University departments and are used to account for the general operations of the University. The Board of Trustees approves the General Trust Fund and its annual budget. Funds may be transferred between accounts within the General Trust Fund following University policy. Funds may be transferred from the General Trust Fund to the Capital Project Trust Fund or Other Trust Funds with approval of the Vice President of Administration and Finance. The President will be notified of all fund transfers on a quarterly basis.

# Westfield State University

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**Capital Project Trust Fund** – Accounts within the Capital Project Trust Fund are used to account for expenses related to facilities renewal and replacement, deferred maintenance, and capital asset acquisition. Once the Board of Trustees has voted and approved the total annual budget, including capital projects, the vote of the Board of Trustees will act as the formal project approval to move forward on projects within the approved total budget. The only signature authority required for individual project documents (e.g., contracts, award documents, requisitions, invoices) will be the Associate Vice President of Facilities and Capital Planning and the Vice President of Administration and Finance, regardless of the total amount per project.

Due to the uncertainty of estimating construction costs, individual capital budget project costs may vary from the initial estimate. The Associate Vice President of Facilities and Capital Planning, in consultation with the Vice President of Administration and Finance, may reallocate funds from one capital project to another but will not exceed the total approved capital budget. However, if the project cost comes in 25% over the original amount approved by vote of the Board of Trustees, the project will go back to the Board of Trustees for review and vote approval.

For new or emergency projects that do not fall within the annual approved budget, the President is the designated authority to establish accounts within the Capital Projects Trust Fund under \$500,000. Any project over \$500,000, which is not part of the annual budget or an emergency, requires Board of Trustees vote approval. Funds may be transferred between accounts within the Capital Project Trust Fund following University policy.

**Other Trust Funds** – Other Trust Funds receive direct revenue to cover expenses within Other Trust Funds. Each is considered its own trust fund. Other Trust Funds are used to track activities not otherwise classified. The Board of Trustees establishes Other Trust Funds. Revenue may not be transferred between or out of Other Trust Funds, unless approved by the President and the Vice President of Administration and Finance.

**Auxiliary Operation Trust Funds** - An Auxiliary Operation Trust Fund is an entity that exists to furnish goods or services primarily to benefit students, faculty or staff, and that charges a fee directly related to, although not necessarily equal to, the cost of the goods or services. Auxiliary goods and services support the educational endeavor of the University and enhance its functioning. The Board of Trustees establishes these Auxiliary Operation Trust Funds. Funds from Auxiliary Operation Trust Funds may not be transferred unless approved by the Vice President of Administration and Finance.

**Grants and Contracts Trust Funds** – Grants and Contract Trust Funds are used to account for the proceeds of federal, state, and/or private funds that are restricted or committed to expenditures for specified purposes. The President is designated authority to establish Grants and Contracts Trust Funds as grant and contract funding is awarded. Grants and Contract Trust Funds must be used in accordance with the submitted budget. A

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listing of all grants and contracts will be provided to the Board of Trustees at the annual June meeting.

**Agency Trust Funds** – Agency Trust Funds are used to account for resources held and administered by the University in a purely custodial capacity for private organizations or individuals, such as honor society and health insurance accounts. The President is designated authority to establish Agency Trust Funds as necessary.

Funds in Agency Trust Funds may not be transferred. A listing of all Agency Trust Funds will be provided to the Board of Trustees at the annual June meeting.

## Bank Accounts

University trust funds are held in accounts approved by the Board of Trustees and on file in the office of the Associate Vice President of Finance. Any changes to the accounts must have the approval of the Board of Trustees.

SUBJECT: Financial Auditing Services RFP and Recommendation

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The University recently participated in a state-wide RFP process for auditing services (Bridgewater State RFP-0026-2026 financial auditing services). The contract award period is through June 30, 2029, with two additional one-year extension options.

The four firms who submitted proposals were BerryDunn, CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP, Withum Smith & Brown P.C., and CBIZ CPA P.C. The RFP review committee awarded all participants an award through this RFP process. Each participating college and university will be executing contracts with the firm of their choice.

After a review of the evaluation and pricing proposals, I recommend the selection of Withum Smith & Brown P.C., one of only two firms receiving an 'A' grade in the committee's evaluation.

Some of the reasons for the recommendation are as follows:

- Withum Smith & Brown has the most experience with Massachusetts Higher Education. As of FY25, they audited 7 out of 9 state universities and 15 out of 15 of the state community colleges.
- There is significant value in continuing with Withum Smith & Brown based on their experience with Massachusetts Higher Ed, our systems, and our policies and procedures. A significant example of this is their experience and thorough understanding of HR/CMS, the state payroll system. Payroll costs account for almost 50% of the University's total annual expenditures. Deep institutional knowledge leads to more efficient audits.
- Withum Smith & Brown is very responsive to our calls and emails throughout the year.
- Withum Smith & Brown has been calculating our GASB 87 and GASB 96 liabilities as non-attest services. If we were to change audit firms, we are not sure if they would perform these services and the University would have to investigate buying software to allow us to calculate these liabilities on our own.
- The price differential, for the base audit only, between CBIZ \$89,000 (for 0-3 schools) and \$90,000 for Withum Smith & Brown (7+ schools) is \$1,000 and we believe the added staff-time needed to provide training for a new audit team would more than make up the difference. As stated earlier, there is also considerable value in having an experienced firm. The base audit fees charged by Withum for FY25 were \$88,500 vs. \$90,000 proposed for FY26 (a \$1,500 or 2% increase over prior year). Overall, our fees will be approximately \$10,000 lower since we are not required to have an audit of our state financial aid (MOSFA) for FY26.

In a recent meeting with the state universities involved in the RFP, it appears that only 1 or 2 of them will change to CBIZ, although they are all still in various stages of the review and approval process. We do not have any information on what the community colleges are doing.

While best practice considers changing audit firms every 5-7 years, partner rotation every 5 years is often sufficient for maintaining independence without the disruption of changing firms. Westfield's audit partner has been the lead on our engagement for 3 years.
