## Alumni Spotlight

#### Alumni, what are YOU up to now?



**Jarrod Petersen** 

Jarrod Petersen, Commonwealth Honors Scholar and Class of 2019 Westfield State University alumnus, successfully defended his PhD thesis in the Department of Ecology, Evolution, and Organismal Biology at Brown University on April 1, 2024. Jarrod's presentation was titled "Serpent Stretch and Strength: Muscle and Tissue Plasticity in Non-Model Systems." While an undergraduate at Westfield State, Jarrod conducted his Senior Honors Project research with his Project Advisor, Dr. Jason Ramsay, Westfield State professor of Biology during the Spring 2018 - Fall 2018 semesters. Jason's research at Westfield State focused on sea robin fin biomechanics related to underwater walking. Congratulations, Jarrod on earning your PhD from Brown University! We look forward to hearing about your future endeavors and achievements.

Nic Taliceo, Commonwealth Honors Scholar and Class of 2016 Westfield State University alumnus, successfully published his research, co-authored with Dr. Julian Fleron, in the Electronic Journal of Combinatorics 31 (2). In the words of Dr. Julian Fleron, Westfield State Mathematics professor and the primary advisor for Nic's Senior Honors Project, "Nic spent almost four years working on his Senior Honors Project research while at Westfield State. He began collecting data as a first-year, undeclared student in Mathematical Explorations and worked on this problem (where the mathematical field of combinators meets landscape ecology) for the entirety of his undergraduate career. We continued to work on the problem together even after Nic graduated. We were pretty confident that we had the main result a precise algebraic and geometric characterization of the maximal number of intercardinal adjacencies in polyominoes as a function of the number of squares. We had an exact upper bound that we had proved and had a lower bound which was within some small percentage of nailing things down exactly. We published a paper on the result in 2021. It's 20 pages, hard, and relies on the work of many others in the field of combinatorics. I wish we could have closed the final 5% gap on our own. But it's clear from the paper that the work is outside both of our professional areas of expertise. Nice to know that we were right!! Especially about a result of significance like this." Congratulations to Nic and Dr. Fleron on this outstanding accomplishment!

Residential students in the Commonwealth Honors Program at Westfield State University can apply to live in the Honors Living and Learning Community (LLC) located on the 5th floor of University Hall. A Living and Learning Community is a campus housing option for groups of students who have shared interests or backgrounds. LLCs prioritize community-building among a cohort of students. The Honors LLC is located in University Hall on the northern edge of the campus Green, next to Ely Campus Center. Students in the Honors LLC live in four or six-person suites, including a shared living room, bathroom, and kitchenette with a full-size fridge. The LLC includes a study lounge, where the Honors Program hosts regular study hours as well as a vibrant community space for social events and professional development workshops.



## Indigenous ArtistsMaking Change

An Upper-level Interdisciplinary Honors Seminar





Students in Dr. Vanessa Diana's *Indigenous Artists Making Change* Spring 2024 upper-level interdisciplinary Honors seminar explored contemporary Native American "artivists" – artists who advocate for social justice by challenging issues such as violence towards Indigenous women, healthcare disparities, and environmental contamination. Students report that these artists helped them recognize the gaps in their prior education about Indigenous people, who are seldom the subject of K-12 curriculum, and, when they are, the focus rarely addresses contemporary Native American people. Artivists reveal the connections between tribal nations' historical legal, military, and cultural conflicts with the U.S. government and the contemporary challenges Native American people confront today while advocating for language and culture revitalization and tribal sovereignty.

I selected to study abroad in New Zealand because I wanted to broaden my horizons beyond European countries, especially since I hold a dual citizenship in England, which makes traveling in Europe more accessible for me as compared with other countries. As I researched my options, I put a lot of weight on three main factors: finding a strong education program, immersing myself in a new country and culture, and being surrounded by gorgeous natural landscapes. Quickly, New Zealand and Thailand rose to the top of my list. After careful consideration, I discussed my final choices with my parents. When I did confide in them, my dad opened up about his wanting to see New Zealand, where he has never been. This solidified my decision to select New Zealand. I wanted to explore the country for not just myself, but for my dad too. I am thankful that I chose New Zealand. Studying abroad has been the best choice I ever made. I had the chance to hear countless fascinating stories and make friendships that I know will last a lifetime. Living with flat mates from Japan, New Zealand, Massachusetts, and Virginia has exposed me to a rich tapestry of cultures. Engaging with different perspectives and diving into life outside of the United States was eyeopening. In particular, the University of Otago excels at welcoming international students from all corners of the globe, so you have the chance to interact with a diverse range of people, not just Kiwis (a common self-reference used by New Zealanders).

Studying in a different country is both immensely challenging and incredibly rewarding. While there significant are differences between the United States and New Zealand, I found myself drawn to aspects of Kiwi culture, such as their use of "sweet as" instead of "cool," their progressive laws, and their commitment to environmental sustainability. Immersing myself in the laidback yet deeply passionate Maori culture has been a true delight. If you have the opportunity, I highly recommend studying abroad and if you have the choice, I encourage you to consider New Zealand.

## Honoring the History of African American Musicians

Honors Course by Contract: Margaret Bonds' "Credo" and the Importance of Honoring the History of African American Musicians

This semester Priscilla Oluokun, Class of 2026 Honors Student and Music Therapy major, completed an Honors Course by Contract in MUSCO201: Music History II with Professor Sonya Lawson. The course involves the study of musical forms and genres developed from the Classical Era through the Twentieth Century. Priscilla and Dr. Lawson collaborated to develop a semester-long research project that would enhance course learning outcomes, by allowing Priscilla to dive deeper into a topic she was passionate about.

Priscilla chose to focus her research on the work of African American pianist and composer, Margaret Bonds, and specifically her seven-movement cantata scored for SATB chorus titled, "Credo". Priscilla noted in her Honors Course by Contract application that "music by African American composers is underrepresented in our textbook," so by presenting her research on Margaret Bonds to the class, Priscilla would be able to diversify the perspectives covered and give special attention to a talented musician who may otherwise have been overlooked.

Dr. Hillary Sackett-Taylor, Honors Program Director, was in attendance for Priscilla's culminating presentation. When asked about the presentation, Dr. Sackett-Taylor said, "Priscilla's presentation was one of the most dynamic student presentations I have seen in my career. She opened her presentation with a beautiful vocal performance of a piece composed by Bonds that simply blew me away. Priscilla then carefully walked the class through her research, and involved them in dissecting three different choral performances of a movement from "Credo". Her work embodied all three of the Honors Program Pillars: 1) Academic Excellence, 2) Community Engagement, and 3) Social Justice. I couldn't be more impressed or prouder of what Priscilla accomplished this semester!"

## Nurturing Creativity With Beverly Army Williams




Writer & Mixed Media Artist

## Honors Speakers Series

### Weaving

With Anna Boutin-Cooper





Join artist and librarian Anna Boutin-Cooper for an interactive artist's talk. Participants will first learn the basic principles of weaving on small bookmark-sized looms, followed by a short talk about Anna's creative practice and a reading of her in-progress creative-nonfiction piece, tentatively titled "Grandma's Placemats." All materials will be provided, and participants will be able to take their minilooms home with them.





#### ABOUT THE PRESENTER:

Anna Boutin-Cooper (she/her) is practicing fiber artist who employs research, creative nonfiction writing, and photography alongside many different fiber arts, like weaving, quilting, and sewing. She is the Research and Instruction Librarian at Westfield State University's Ely Library, where she also curates and manages the Zine Collection. Her current lines of research include her familial/ancestral history with textiles and fiber arts, disability in the library classroom, and neurodiversity and invisible disabilities in the library.

Participants learned basic principles of weaving, created bookmark-sized weavings on small looms, heard Anna Boutin-Cooper's talk about her creative practice, listened to a reading of her in-progress creative nonfiction piece, "Grandma's Placemats," and lastly were able to take home their mini-looms and materials to finish their weaving creations.

## Northeast Regional Honors Council Conference

What is the Northeast Regional Honors Council Conference?

The 2024 Northeast Regional Honors Council (NRHC) Conference took place from April 4 - 7, in Albany, New York. 




